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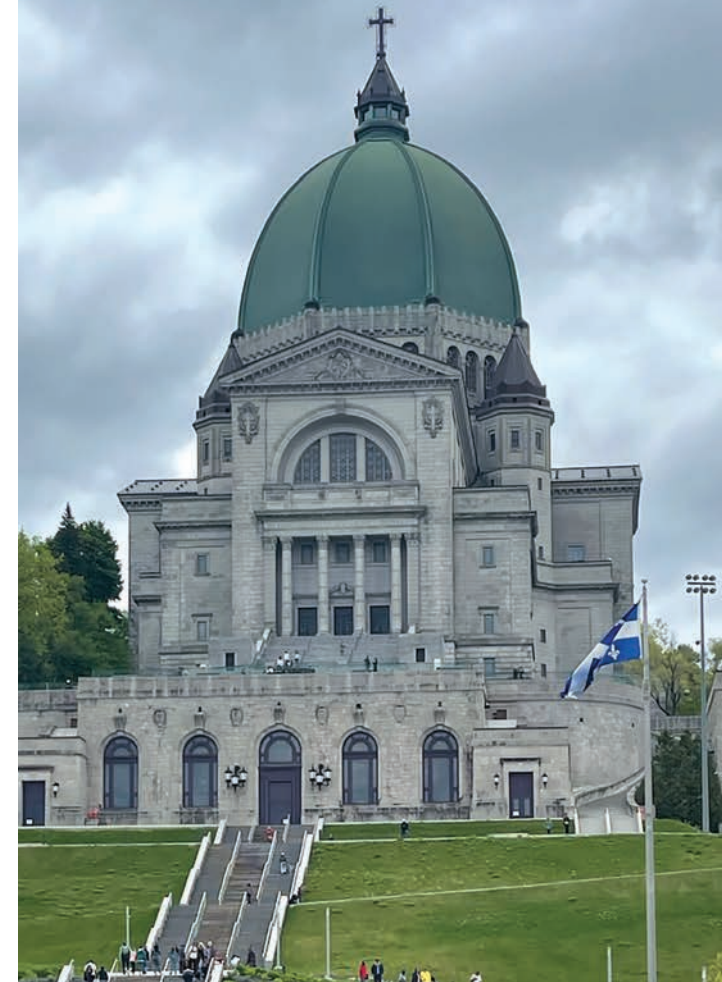

Canada:

Faith, Justice, and Culture in Québec



Led by Margarita Rose, Ph.D. (Economics), and Fr. Dan Issing, C.S.C. (Theology), this short-term faculty-led study abroad program will allow students to observe how Canada's historical experiences of colonization and assimilation impacted its contemporary challenges of reconciliation, immigration, and identity in an age of climate change and trade wars. Moreover, students will develop fluency in the language of Catholic Social Teaching, with which they will carry out ethical and economic analyses of these current issues. In class and in encounters with English- and French-speaking Canadian students and scholars, program participants will gain a broad understanding of the economic, cultural, and ethical conditions facing today's local and global societies.

The Program

With cosmopolitan Montréal and the provincial capital, Québec, as their classrooms, students will experience the beauty of Québécois language and culture, seemingly so different, yet close enough to be reached on a single day journey by road and rail from Pennsylvania.

Through a partnership with Concordia University, students will attend lectures by Canadian scholars. They'll have opportunities to connect their Holy Cross Experience (HCE) to the global community at St. Joseph's Oratory. Through a focus on Saint Brother André Bessette, students will delve into the relationship of education and worship to justice and the common good. Visits to St. Kateri Tekakwitha's shrine in the Kahnawake Mohawk Territory and the Holocaust Museum of Montréal will highlight human resilience. Tours of historic sites will explain reasons for current tensions between language and ethnic groups. Encounters with the human imagination will occur at the Musée des Beaux Arts in Montréal and the Musée de la civilisation in Québec.

Estimated program cost of \$4,100 covers all travel, accommodations, most meals, lectures, site visits, insurance and 3-credit King's College tuition. Financial aid and scholarships are available.
