Serbia-Bosnia & Herzegovina-Croatia:

Yugoslavia – Twice there was a Country



As part of King's College's "Geographies of Europe" series, this two-week faculty-led study abroad program explores how identity, memory, and political boundaries have shaped the former Yugoslavia. Through historic sites and local culture, they examine divisions between Christian and Muslim worlds, competing ideas of civilization and barbarism, and the boundaries of Europe itself. Students consider how borders are created, naturalized, and remembered, identities are contested, and Yugoslavia's dissolution reveals both the consequences of division and possibilities for coexistence.

The Program

This program travels from Belgrade, Serbia, through Sarajevo and Mostar, Bosnia-Herzegovina, with side trips to Tito's underground bunker and the famous bridge at Višegrad, before continuing to Zagreb, Croatia. While on the program, students will be asked to investigate several important questions:

- How are borders naturalized? What do they mean? How are they related to historical memory and memorialization?
- What are the costs and benefits of "joining Europe" or, alternatively, of being "left out?"
- How are these issues relevant to our own culture and society?

Traveling through the Balkans will give students the opportunity to think through these larger questions in real time and to see how they are expressed and transformed through culture, landscape, and memory.

The estimated cost of the program is \$5,000. The price includes all travel, accommodations, most meals, lectures, site visits, emergency medical insurance, and three-credit King's College tuition. Financial aid and scholarships are available.
