Transformation: Our colleges and universities offer intellectual, moral, and spiritual formation of the mind and heart that honors the integration of faith and reason.


Zeal: Zeal is the sacred fire that enkindles transformation in us and ignites the desire to act boldly for the good of neighbor, society, and the global community.

Founder of the Congregation



Blessed Basil Moreau (1799-1873), a priest from LeMans, France, founded the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1837. He envisioned priests, brothers, sisters and laypeople working in close collaboration to transform society, especially through the ministry of education.

Placing his confidence in God's love he chose the motto, "The Cross, Our Only Hope," for his new congregation and entrusted Holy Cross to the intercession of Our Lady of Sorrows as its patron. Moreau was declared "blessed" on September 15, 2007.

Service Today

King's and the local Holy Cross Community are entering their 79th year. Currently, 12 "C.S.C.s" (the Community's Latin name is, "Congregatio a Sancta Cruce") serve at King's and in the Wyoming Valley. Of those, 10 minister at the college; two other ministers locally.



CROSS AND ANCHORS

The origin of the Cross and Anchors as the symbol of the Congregation of Holy Cross can be traced to Blessed Basil Moreau's love for a sixth-century hymn, "Vexilla Regis" which includes the phrase, "O Spes Unica, Crux Ave," "Hail the Cross, Our Only Hope." Father Moreau's faith in the cross as the promise and guarantor of salvation led him to propose the cross overlaid with anchors, the symbol of hope, as the seal of his Congregation.

HOLY CROSS

A Brief History

The Holy Cross Community was founded at Sainte Croix ("Holy Cross"), France, in 1837 by Fr. Basil Anthony Moreau. He envisioned a religious community of priests, brothers, and sisters who would assist the diocesan clergy, teach at all levels of education, and respond to other pressing needs in the church.

In 1841, the first Holy Cross priests and brothers came to America. Late in November of 1842, Fr. Sorin and six brothers arrived at what is now South Bend, Indiana, and began building what would become the University of Notre Dame. Since that time, three Holy Cross Congregations of priests, brothers, and sisters have founded nine colleges and universities.

CELEBRATING A SAINT




Brother Andre Bessette, CSC, beatified in 1982, was canonized in Rome in October, 2010. 
Rev. Dan Issing, C.S.C., Ph.D. *Chair, Theology Department*


Rev. Brogan Ryan, C.S.C. *College Chaplain, Director of Campus Ministry*

He now serves as the Superior of the local Holy Cross Community and as Campus Minister for Faculty and Staff.



Rev. Tom O'Hara, C.S.C., Ph.D. *Academic Advising, President Emeritus*

From Hazleton, PA, and a graduate of King's College, Father Tom taught political science before serving as the President of the College from 1999 to 2011. He was then elected to be the Provincial Superior of the U.S. Province of Holy Cross. Father Tom now works in Academic Advising.



Rev. Michael Wurtz, C.S.C., S.L.D. *Theology Department*

From Pocahontas, AR, Father Michael studied Liturgical Theology in Rome and is in his sixth year teaching at King's. He regularly assists at the English-Use parish of St. Thomas More in Scranton.



Rev. Ricky Bevington, C.S.C. *Campus Ministry*

From Delmont, PA, Fr. Ricky arrived at King's in 2024. He previously ministered in Student Affairs at both Stonehill College and the University of Notre Dame. He serves as the Assistant Director of Campus Ministry and lives in residence in Luksic Hall. He was ordained a priest in April 2025.

From Albany, NY, Brother John has served as Principal of Notre Dame High School in West Haven, CT; President of Bishop McNamara High School in Maryland; and President of Holy Cross College at Notre Dame, IN. 
Br. Jimmy Henke, C.S.C. *Residence Life*

Jenkins eventually earned a doctorate at the University of San Francisco and spent more than thirty years in Catholic school leadership before returning to the area to serve in parish ministry.
