Profession of Faith

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist

Presentation and Preparation of the Gifts

(Please be seated)

As the choir sings "Christ Has No Body Now But Yours" by Steven C. Warner, bread and wine—fruits of the earth and vine—are brought to the altar.

These simple gifts become for us the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. The altar, gifts, and assembly are incensed as a sign of our reverence for the "holy" in our midst and a symbol of our prayer.

Invitation to Prayer (Please stand)

Priest: Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father.

The assembly rises and replies:

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

Prayer over the Offerings

The priest now prays the great Eucharistic Prayer in the name of the assembly.

The prayer expresses our thanksgiving to God the Father for the life, death and resurrection of his Son, Jesus. The prayer is offered through the power of the Holy Spirit. During the Eucharistic Prayer, the community believes that the bread and wine become the real presence of Jesus.


Priest: The Lord be with you.

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The Lord's Prayer

(Please stand)

Priest: At the Savior's command and formed by divine teaching, we dare to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven hallowed be thy name; Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

The assembly concludes the prayer, acclaiming:

Assembly: And with your spirit.


Priest: Let us offer each other the sign of peace.


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Communion Procession




