By studying the past, we can determine how decisions—good or bad—impacted the outcome of local, national and world events.

Program Structure

King's history curriculum builds upon the foundational history courses in American, Western and global history that students take as a part of our core curriculum. Whatever the subject matter, all courses aim at developing analytical skills, techniques of research, and effective communication. Students of history are encouraged to study abroad, take part in experiential learning (such as internships), and conduct independent study and research. Many choose to complement their skills with another area of study or selecting a minor in another discipline in order to best meet their personal interests and career goals.

Careers in History

While teaching is a popular choice, history majors also work in government agencies, research, publishing, historical preservation, and museums. With

strong communication, research and writing skills, many history majors seek careers in business, journalism and filmmaking. History majors often pursue graduate degrees in law, international relations and education.
