¹ Students are required to take CORE 150, CORE 180 **OR** CORE 190 to fulfill the Interdisciplinary CORE requirement.

- If a student takes CORE 150, then he/she should choose from 181 – 188 to fulfill the 18x requirement AND from 191 – 198 to fulfill the 19x requirement.
- If a student takes CORE 180, then he/she should choose from 151 – 158 to fulfill the 15x requirement AND from 191 – 198 to fulfill the 19x requirement.
- If a student takes CORE 190, then he/she should choose from 151 – 158 to fulfill the 15x requirement AND from 181 – 188 to fulfill the 18x requirement.

³ Students majoring in English/Literature must complete CORE 110 and a course from CORE 163-166 prior to enrolling in ENGL 200 and ENGL 241.

⁴ Students should strongly consider taking MATH 101 and MATH 102 in place of CORE 120. The content of the MATH 101/MATH 102 sequence is consistent with the material found on the Basic Skills examination. Together, MATH 101 and MATH 102 satisfy the three math credits required for King's College Core Curriculum as well as the six credit math requirement for Education.

⁵ EDUC 299 Basic Skills is a pre-requisite for all 300 and 400 level education courses and ENGL 399. In order to register for this course, you must take and pass all basic skills tests. Formal application to the Education Department between 48 and 60 credits – failure to complete EDUC 299 by 60 credits will result in the dropping of teacher certification in compliance with PDE regulations.

General Information:

A student must earn a minimum of 120 credit hours to be awarded the baccalaureate degree. The number of credit hours required for graduation may be higher in certain major programs **or** if the student elects to pursue a second major.

Beyond the requirements of the Core Curriculum and of a student's chosen major program, the balances of the credit hours required for graduation are "free electives." **Because of the CORE, Major, and Secondary Education requirements, there are no "Free Electives" for students majoring in English/Secondary Education.**

 - CORE courses may be taken in any order approved by the academic advisor with the following conditions:
 - CORE 100 and CORE 110 should be taken in the first year.
 - CORE 115 (or 116) and CORE 120 should be taken within the first two years.
 - For students selecting a Foreign Language (CORE 14x), every effort should be made to register for that language in the first semester at King's.
