Course Requirements

In addition to their major course requirements, students admitted to the Honors Program take the following courses in place of the Core requirements. There is no one-to-one correspondence between the Honors courses and Core courses. Instead, completing the Honors requirements in their entirety replaces completing the Core requirements in their entirety. Students are able to seek approval for Honors core course substitutions from the Honors Program Director.
